
## **JOHN 'SAILOR' HUNTER**

# (MANAGER 1911-1946/SECRETARY 1946-1959)

## **MOTHERWELL FC 1911 – 1959**





Without doubt the most important figure in the history of Motherwell FC.

John Bryson Hunter was born in Johnstone, Renfrewshire on 6<sup>th</sup> April 1878. His playing career started as an 18 year old in 1896 with Abercorn who were playing in the Scottish Second Division having been relegated the previous season.

He made 20 appearances before joining Liverpool in 1899. Whilst at Anfield he won the First Division League Championship in 1900-01 playing 37 times in the famous red kit and scoring 10 goals.

He moved back to Scotland in 1902 signing for Hearts for a fee of £300 and was a member of the Hearts side that lost 2-0 in the 1903 Scottish Cup Final at Celtic Park after a second replay v Rangers.

In May 1904 he moved south again and joined Woolwich Arsenal for a transfer fee of £165, he played 22 times during season 1904-05 scoring 4 goals.

In 1905 he moved to Southern League side Portsmouth making 37 appearances and scoring 11 goals.

In 1907 he made his final move as a player, transferring to Dundee where he started scoring goals for fun, in the 3 years at Dens Park he scored an impressive 46 goals in only 61 appearances. During this period he won his only Scotland cap in a 3-2 defeat by Wales in Wrexham on 1st March 1909.

He played for Dundee in the 1910 Scottish Cup Final at Ibrox against Clyde. With 6 minutes remaining and Clyde up 2-0 John pulled one back before a late equaliser to force a replay which ended 0-0. In the second replay at Ibrox Clyde scored after 3 minutes with Dundee equalising in the 15<sup>th</sup> minute before John scored the winner in the 56<sup>th</sup> minute.

In September 1910 he moved to Clyde but due to injury he was forced to retire from playing the game without making an appearance for the Bully Wee.

John arrived at Fir Park in April 1911 initially taking up the post of manager and then in February 1913 he also took over the Secretary's duties due to the then incumbent Mr Barrie moving abroad.

When he arrived Motherwell the team had just finished second bottom of the First Division above relegated Queens Park. In his first full season 1911-12 the team finished in 14<sup>th</sup> place. However there was one sign of what the future might hold, he managed the reserve side to the Reserve League Championship in 1911-12.

In 1916 he signed a player who would become one of the clubs most prolific goal scorers, Hughie Ferguson. His 284 league goals in 288 appearances is a club record.

In May 1923 John signed a player who would later succeed him as 'Well manager, George Stevenson from Ayrshire Junior side, Kilbirnie Ladeside.

When the new offside law was introduced in 1925 which now only needed two players instead of three being between the goal and the player playing the ball he saw this as an opportunity to play a more attacking style of football and score goals. This style helped Ferguson and Willie MacFadyen rattle in the goals in great numbers.

For 8 seasons commencing with season 1926-27 until 1933-34 Motherwell never finished lower than 3<sup>rd</sup> in Division 1. During those years John managed the club to its first ever Championship by 5 points over Rangers in 1931-32. Playing a skilful but effective style of football that was a delight for fans of all clubs to watch, they scored 119 goals with MacFadyen hitting the net 52 times.

John pioneered the idea of playing teams from other nations and was responsible for taking the club on the tours of France & Spain in May/June 1927, South America in May/June 1928, South Africa in May/June 1931, Belgium & France in May 1932 and again to South Africa in May/June/July 1934.

He was Motherwell manager from April 1911 to the end of 1945-1946 season when he was replaced by George Stevenson, then appointed secretary at the start of 1946-47 season, eventually retiring from duty at Fir Park aged 80 in 1959.


His managerial record is impressive; 1166 games, won 568, drew 245, lost 354, scoring 2338 goals.

Honours; Scottish First Division Champions 1932. Runners-up 1929-30, 1932-33. Scottish Cup Runners-up 1930-31, 1932-33, 1938-39.

The East stand at Fir Park was renamed The John Hunter Stand in his honour in November 2016.

He died on 12th January 1966 age 86.


Hopefully after reading this and recognising his achievements you agree that he was the most important person ever to walk through the doors of Fir Park.

The trophy is the Scottish Police Cup won by Lanarkshire Constabulary in 1927-28, John may be representing MFC or presenting the trophy








